A personal thank you to Jack Layton

I met the Right Hon. Jack Layton in the early eighties during my second year at Ryerson. He was my politics teacher. He seemed like all my other professors friendly, nice, except that he told us to call him Jack. And Jack it was after that.

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WHAT IS HAPPENING WITH THE PORT TOWER PROJECT?

We constantly get questions about the tower project. Residents want to know what is happening and when and there are always unconfirmed rumours. To provide accurate, up-to-date information to our readers, members of the Port Dalhousie Conservancy's Executive met with the City's senior planning staff, the Mayor and the new owner of the project. Below is a summary of the information we obtained.

Who owns the project now? Mr. Derek Martin, who has extensive experience with construction firm Concreate USL LP, purchased the interest previously held by Mr. Dan Raseta and Mr. Ralph Terrio in June of this year and now owns 100% of Port Dalhousie Vitalization Corporation (PDVC). Messrs. Raseta and Terrio retained ownership of properties on the west side of Lock St. including the Lions and the Bank Building

Who is Landform Canada Construction? This is a development company formed by Mr. Martin. It will be the project's developer in conjunction with Niacon of Niagara Falls.

Who is Niacon? Niacon is an experienced construction company which has a joint venture agreement with Landform. Niacon has built high rise hotels in the Falls and its President, Mr. Chris Hawkswell, will be in charge of construction and all site activities.

Is there a team of architects and engineers in place? Mr. Martin has retained architect Michael Kirkland, previously hired by Messres. Raseta and Terrio, as well as other experts/professionals -some also previously on the team. Some key team members include heritage architect James Smith of Stanford Downey Architects Inc. in Toronto, theatre consultant Brian Arnott and Smith and Andersen for mechanical and electrical engineering.

What will the project include? Mr. Martin is very familiar with the February 2009 OMB decision and intends to build the project with the theatre, hotel and other components exactly as they were approved by the OMB.

Are the planned condos sold? According to Mr. Martin, they have not yet launched a full sales effort. They will be doing this after demolition of the buildings they deem to be not of significant heritage value (Ice Cream Store, Rum Jungle and Convenience Store) has started.

When will these buildings be demolished? The developer is working with the City to meet conditions required for demolition permits as soon as possible. The Planning Services Department confirmed that, as we went to press, no demolition permits have been applied for or issued.

What work is being done behind the Ice Cream Store and around the Jail? According to Mr. Martin, nothing major is happening. They are just cleaning up the site in anticipation of construction work eventually starting. (Continued on page 2)

GO DOGS GO

We're not quite finished with summer and already the Niagara Ice Dogs are gearing up for an exciting hockey season.

The 2011/2012 season officially kicked off Aug. 31 with the start of training camp. The first exhibition game ended in a tie in front of 2,113 fans on Sept. 10.

The Ice Dogs have been ranked second in the Canadian Hockey League rankings - quite an honour. Ice Dogs general manager/coach Marty Williamson knows a top preseason ranking is no guarantee for success. The

team has 68 games to play, and you have to take into consideration injuries, health of the team, peaking at the right time, chemistry, and getting on the ice to win. Team owner Bill Burke was thrilled to hear the second place ranking. The Ice Dogs have geared themselves towards the top of the OHL Eastern Conference, which can be attributed to the volume of talent the team has been able to assemble.

The rankings are timed perfectly, as city council will be debating in October on the new spectator facility for the Ice Dogs. It's exciting for the community to have a team that could be in the Memorial Cup, bringing excitement and exposure for our community.

The Niagara Ice Dogs have a remarkable nine NHL drafted players - Freddie Hamilton, San Jose Sharks; Ryan Strome, New York Islanders; Dougie Hamilton, Boston Bruins; Mark Visentin, Phoenix Coyotes; Mitchel Theoret, New York Islanders; Alex Friesen, Vancouver Canucks; David Pacan, Florida Panthers; Steven Shipley, Buffalo Sabres; Brock Beukeboom, St. Louis Blues. Due to their status as overagers, Friesen and Pacan could be assigned to a minor league affiliate of their NHL club, while other Ice Dog prospects can play up to nine games before they are either retained by the NHL team or sent back to the Ice Dogs. With a strong returning core and some great new additions, this season is setting up to be a great one for the Ice Dogs.

With such a strong team fans will want to be sure to get their tickets early. Single game tickets have already gone on sale. Single game ticket pricing for the 2011/12 Ice Dog season will be as follows: Premium \$20, Ends \$19, Standing \$14.50, Youth/Senior (end seats only) \$16.50.

Is moving the Jail safe? Both Mr. Martin and Mr. Hawkswell feel confident that their experts will be able to move the Jail out of the way for construction and then return it without damage.

When do they expect construction to begin? No definite date is available although they are working hard to start as soon as possible. Many of the required drawings are ready.

How long will construction take? From the time construction starts, Mr. Martin estimates it will take 24-26 months to complete the project. Of this, 5-6 months will be required for the initial excavation work.

Will there be major disruption for residents and businesses during construction? Mr. Hawkswell is working with the City to develop a plan to minimize the impact and, in particular, traffic closures. They will not be working on Sundays.

How will we know when they are ready to start? The developer is working on a weekly that will provide up-to-date information on a weekly basis. They expect the website to be operational within the next month. September 17, 2011

PROUD becomes the Port Dalhousie Conservancy. By David Bergen

The Port Dalhousie Conservancy: PROUD adopts a new name.

On August 26, 2011, the general membership of PROUD Port Dalhousie voted to adopt a new name: Port Dalhousie Conservancy Inc.. The name change more accurately reflects the current scope of the organization's work and focus on enhancing and preserving Port's unique cultural, natural and built heritage.

PROUD (Port Recognizing Our Unique Distinction) was formed in March 1999 by a group of community residents to pursue heritage designation for Port Dalhousie. There was a concern that uncontrolled development could alter the unique character of the area as well as result in the loss of significant heritage buildings. Heritage designation would provide some

level of controls on both demolitions and development and so help to maintain Port's unique heritage character.

Heritage designation was achieved in December, 2003, but the name was maintained when the organization realized, almost immediately afterwards that it would have to contest the advisability of the PDVC condominium tower complex. Community name recognition was an important part of the process.

Those struggles are now over and it was decided to make a name change that is both self-explanatory and speaks clearly to the organizational goals. (The name PROUD has always required significant explanation when discussing it with someone unfamiliar with its history)

Other names of other conservancies: "The Nature Conservancy", "Architectural Conservancy of Ontario" and the "Bruce Trail Conservancy" all speak clearly to their goals and nature. Now the "Port Dalhousie Conservancy", while still the same not-for-profit volunteer organization that it always was, has a name that does the same.



SCANDAL OVER ILLEGAL ELECTION CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS - UPDATE


There continues to be great public interest in this subject. As we reported in our Summer edition, long-time Port resident and former Regional Councillor Eleanor Lancaster filed a request for audit of expenses of candidates Rigby, Petrowski, Dorsey, Harris, Siscoe and Stack alleging they violated Election Act by accepting overcontributions from related companies owned or controlled by Port Tower developer Mr. Dan Raseta. Mr. Raseta immediately reversed his previously stated position on multiple contributions and his lawyer wrote the candidates asking them to pay money back. The candidates listed promptly admitted they violated the Act and stated they have paid or will pay money back.

On July 19th, the Niagara Compliance Audit Committee held a hearing on Ms. Lancaster's requests Despite the fact that the 4 City candidates identified by

Ms. Lancaster (Regional candidates Rigby and Petrowski were spared a hearing on a technicality) admitted accepting overcontributions from Mr. Raseta, the hearing Chair rejected all four audit applications because they paid the money back and to save the taxpayers money. Ms. Lancaster was praised in media reports for identifying the violations. However, it was left up to her as an individual concerned citizen if she wanted to pursue this further. She argued at the hearing that campaign spending makes a difference in the quality of a campaign, and the extra money the candidates accepted and spent might have had an impact on the election outcome, especially for a candidate like Stack, who won his seat by only 26 votes. To no avail.

UPDATE: As reported in other media, Ms. Lancaster decided these violations were too serious to just let them drop and filed a notice with the Ontario Court of Justice to appeal the Compliance Audit Committee's decision. The parties appeared before Judge David Harris on September 9th and Judge Harris scheduled a hearing on the appeal for November 24, 2011 at 2 pm. Ms. Lancaster, who as a concerned citizen is pursuing this at her own expense, will be represented by lawyer Luigi De Lisio while the City of St. Catharines (on behalf of the Committee) will be represented by new City Solicitor Nicole Auty. Candidate Dorsey will be representing himself and Candidates Harris, Siscoe and Stack will be represented by lawyer Tom Richardson. Mr. Richardson, a former City Solicitor, has previously acted as one of Mr. Raseta's companies' leading lawyers in pursuing approval of the Port Tower proposal.

A personal thank you to Jack Layton

I met the Right Hon. Jack Layton in the early eighties during my second year at Ryerson. He was my politics teacher. He seemed like all my other professors - friendly, reared its ugly head and the zealots were doing what nice, except that he told us to call him Jack. And Jack it was after that.

He had an exceptional way of making one comfortable but also challenging one to think. He was inclusive of all views - as long as you could back up your opinion with data, Jack allowed it. That was something that was very difficult for Again I was amazed at how openly he remembered me this diehard social democrat. To me the world was white and black-literally. I was a person of colour in a largely white institution, in a program where 95% of the students were Jack 'Walked his Talk!' Through 'walking his talk,' he white, 99.999% of the faculty and the administration were let this angry young woman know that they were others also white.

Some of you might come to the conclusion at this point in your reading that I may have had a small chip on my Each night, since reading Jack's last letter to the shoulder. Well you're wrong-it was one big huge boulder Canadian people, I use Jack's last word as my mantra: that was hard to carry but carry it I did, with all the dignity "Love is better than anger, hope is better than fear, of one who has intimately experienced racism, classism, sexism, and ageism.

In a class of 40+ and who knows how many other students that he taught that year, Jack noticed a young woman's anger and helped channel it.

Jack did not need to take time to talk to me in the cafeteria, which I used as my study room in between classes and jobs-I had two part time jobs [which paid for my books and tuition] and numerous volunteer jobs [which educated me]. Every time I happened to see Jack in the 'caf', he always acknowledged my presence: "Hey Gloria, how's it going." "That essay on the politics of poverty was really good, you researched it well." "Is that what you really think of politicians, Gloria?" -"there are some good ones, Gloria!"

These dialogues sometimes lasted a minute, sometimes ten.

My real learning with Jack though began on the streets of Toronto. As a young social work student who saw herself as a social change agent, the streets of Toronto were fertile ground for learning the need for social change. As attended rallies and marches: protesting police brutality, or apartheid; advocating adequate social housing, or antipoverty measures; promoting gay rights or a ban on South African goods - Jack was there, many times with a placard but much more often with a camera.

When I helped out at a soup kitchen on Yonge Street-Jack was there. I don't know if he was serving or working in the kitchen- usually I was on my way out and Jack was on his way in. When I was supporting a petition advocating giving free needles [HIV had just zealots do] Jack was one of the first to sign.

Years later, I met Jack at a workshop on 'Accessing the Media'. Jack was one of the keynote speakers. He recognized me in the crowd and was genuinely interested in what I was doing and how I was doing. and cared about my journey.

who cared about and were assisting those among us who were hurting and suffering.

optimism is better than despair. I am loving, hopeful, and optimistic." "The world is changing."



The angry young woman hopefully, has become a wise woman still filled with compassion and generosity but hopefully filled with understanding, forgiveness and light. Thank you Jack for helping me all those years ago in your subtle yet very conscious way; and today for for helping me remember to stay

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hopeful in the midst of a poverty of consciousness that WE, as a Canadian people, are working through. We ARE ALL ONE.

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HISTORY OF THE PORT DALHOUSIE CONSERVANCY

A Distinguished History as a Volunteer Community Organization

The Port Dalhousie Conservancy Inc. ("the Conservancy") is a Port Dalhousie community-based, volunteer organization founded in 1999 to pursue Heritage Designation. Its current mandate is to help enhance and preserve Port Dalhousie's unique cultural, natural and built heritage, and to reflect the views of residents on other major community issues. It is incorporated as a not-for-profit Ontario corporation. Below is a summary of the Conservancy's history.

March 1999 – PROUD (now the Conservancy) Founded in Port Dalhousie – Concern Over Alexander Muir's Homestead. A group of residents concerned about the possible loss of Alexander Muir's historic home on Dalhousie Avenue met to consider the options. The City's Heritage Planner explained that having the area designated as a Heritage Conservation District under the Ontario Heritage Act was the only way to have some protection for the area's unique character. It would be a lot of hard work and would take years, the planner warned, as the community would have to be canvassed for support. It would then require Council's support and, eventually, that of the Ontario Municipal Board. Undeterred, the group decided to proceed and PROUD (Port Realizing Our Unique Distinction) was born!

March 1999 to December 2003 - Seeking Input From the Community, Designation by Council and Final OMB Approval. The initial group held its first public meeting at historic Dalhousie House in May 1999. More volunteers came forward and a very public and democratic process was launched. This process included multiple public information meetings and distribution of a survey designed by the City's Planning Services Department to over 600 homes and businesses to find out whether they wanted to pursue Heritage Designation. In October 1999, the group presented the survey results to Council: "Our volunteers are pleased to report that the results are overwhelmingly in favour of designation". There were more public meetings, a consultant's study and, following approval by Council, the OMB approved the designation in December 2003 and found that: "..the process followed by the City has been a full public process and all requirements of the Province have been complied with." and "... the designation of the subject area as a Heritage Conservation District represents good planning."

January to May, 2004 – Designing and Funding Heritage Street Signs for Port Dalhousie. Despite the lengthy process to secure Heritage Designation, the tireless volunteers then took on another major challenge –distinctive signage to identify the new district and enhance community pride. A committee was first struck to design appropriate signage. This committee did extensive research and designed street and gateway signs that emphasize the 1829 opening of the First Welland Canal at Port Dalhousie and the Village's original Seal of Incorporation. The greatest challenge

was then to raise the approximately \$20,000 required since the City was unable to fund these new signs. Volunteers were told it might take years to raise this money and the signs would have to be introduced a street at a time. Much to everyone's amazement, our Sign Fundraising Committee was able to raise all required funds within three weeks. All 68 street signs and two gateway signs were installed by late Spring.

June 4, 2004 – Official Heritage Designation Ceremony and Celebration. The ceremony was attended by many residents as well as Mayor Rigby, several City and Regional Councillors, local MPP Jim Bradley, local MP Walt Lastewka and, last but not least, a number of international delegates to the 2004 World Canals Conference. The international delegates remarked on how well-preserved and unique Port Dalhousie was and called Port one of the last relatively-intact 19th century canal villages. The efforts of our volunteers were recognized by the St. Catharines Heritage Committee and City Councillors. Messrs. Bradley and Lastewka each presented appreciation certificates on behalf of the Provincial and Federal governments.

June 18, 2004 to October 2005 - The First PDVC Tower Proposal. In February, 2004, only weeks after OMB approval of the Heritage Designation, the newlyformed Port Dalhousie Vitalization Corporation (PDVC) informed us of their preliminary plans. Over the next few months, the size and scope of the proposed development became clear. Our volunteers developed a Draft Position on the development and validated it through a community-wide Survey which showed

"Port residents strongly (90%) rejected the proposed tower and felt ANY new development must preserve the Streetscape and Heritage Buildings, maintain Public Access and not aggravate Parking/Traffic problems".

PDVC disregarded the Survey and proceeded with its proposal so our volunteers announced their SOS (Save Our Seaport) Campaign to oppose it. A website and the Port Reporter were launched to communicate the local community's widespread opposition and a second, city-wide Quantitative Survey was done by Brock University that showed the majority of residents across all City wards were opposed. Then, suddenly in October 2005, PDVC withdrew the proposal.

December 2005 to October 2006 – Second Tower Proposal . Despite widespread opposition to the withdrawn proposal throughout the City, St. Catharines' Mayor Tim Rigby, who suddenly stated he was in favour of the proposal all along, led an effort to "try and reignite" the proposal. The developer hired a new architect and in early 2006 re-introduced a second, very similar, proposal. Once again, our volunteers studied the proposal carefully before deciding they had no option but to oppose it. There was a marathon Council meeting in June 2006 and the community put on an amazing display of determination with 65 individuals speaking from the heart to tell Councillors why this was the wrong proposal for their cherished village

Dorothy Crabtree bound into Port's history by Ted Gould

Why is it important to understand Port's history? By understanding our history, you can understand why things are the way they are right now. Many of the past events and histories in the world have shaped what we are today. Dorothy Crabtree helped shape what Port is today. Dorothy led the fight to not only keep the carousel in Port but to ensure it would be here for generations to come. When Sid Brookson put the 1903 Looff carousel up for auction in 1970, Dorothy lead a group to raise funds to buy it and keep it in Port. Although the fundraising fell \$5,000 short of the \$25,000 asking price, Sid Brookson agreed to the amount raised and together they convinced the City of St. Catharines to accept and maintain it in Port, with the proviso that the cost of a ride remain at five cents and that agreement stands today. If it wasn't for her caring and determination, Port would not have the Carousel to grace our park and bring joy into the lives of countless families. People travel from across the continent to enjoy the fruits of her labour and she will live on in our images of Lakeside Park and the Looff carousel.

My history is intertwined with the Crabtrees only as it relates to the Crabtree house that we purchased at 34 Bayview. I learned that wherever the Crabtrees settled, a crabapple tree was planted on the property. Today you can see a full grown crabapple tree on the front lawn of the house on Bayview and now you understand why things are the way they are right now. History is so important because each of us is part of the history that takes place. We can choose to help out situations that

matter to us and help to build a better tomorrow. Dorothy Crabtree died Aug. 10 at Linhaven Home for the Aged. She was 96.



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The Dirt on Anti-Bacterial Soap

How many anti-bacterial soaps or detergents do you have in your home? I used to have several. I assumed they were safe and better than ordinary soaps, especially as they are far easier to get than soaps without antimicrobial properties. Now I know better, and can only agree with Oscar Wilde's words: "When you assume, you make an ass out of u and me."

Health Effects of Anti-Bacterial Soap

According to several studies, there is little difference in the number of bacteria killed by antibacterial soap over regular soap. Also, it seems that domestic chemical disinfectants may contribute to decreased health. "Improvements in hand hygiene resulted in reductions in gastrointestinal illness of 31% and reductions in respiratory illness of 21%with use of nonantibacterial soap. Use of antibacterial soap showed little added benefit compared with use of nonantibacterial soap."

.....Similarly, The United States Center for Disease Control says: "Currently, no evidence suggests that use of antibacterial soap (containing 0.2% triclosan) provides a benefit over plain soap in reducing bacterial counts and rate of infectious symptoms in generally healthy persons in the household setting." The use of the antibiotic Triclosan is particularly hazardous.

Toxic Triclosan

This is a synthetic, broad-spectrum antimicrobial agent used in a wide variety of household- and personal care products, including: antibiotic wipes, gels, creams, soaps, toothpaste, deodorant, cosmetics, lotions, plastics, mattresses, fabrics, and more. Yet it is now known that

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Triclosan comes with frightening health consequences. As Dr Angela McGhee Ph.D., Biology and Marine Sciences comments: Triclosan is a chlorophenol and pesticide, a class of chemicals which is suspected of causing cancer in humans. Taken internally, even in small amounts, phenol can lead to cold sweats, circulatory collapse, convulsions, coma and death. Additionally, chlorinated hydrocarbon pesticides can be stored in body fat, sometimes accumulating to toxic levels.

...... Moreover, Triclosan comes with environmental hazards. It causes all kinds of problems when washed down the drain. Even when this drain water is treated at whitewater treatment plants, triclosan is not removed. It is highly toxic to algae and is thought to have detrimental endocrine effects on fish. It also encourages cross-resistant bacteria. I could go on. But you get the picture I'm sure!

Uncertain Times in Port continued Preface:

Part 1 of this article (Summer Edition) stated the new members of the Port Dalhousie Heritage Committee "on the surface, appear to be more interested in promoting Reporter, members of the Port Dalhousie development than in protecting Port's heritage fabric." We should clarify that this was only an assumption based in part on the strong heritage credentials of the members that were replaced, and to some extent, on the voting patterns of council in selecting the members of the new committee. In fact, only one of those new members is known to have publicly opposed the positions of the heritage committee. Any suggestion that the newly appointed members have demonstrated a lack of interest in protecting heritage was not intended.

The Future of Uncertainty:

Our earlier musings on the future of Port, in retrospect look pretty bleak. We have followed the proposed tower development through its various incarnations. Perhaps it is our naivety that makes it almost unimaginable

that the transformation predicted for the corner of Lock and Main will unfold as described. Although others may disagree, it appears that the Port we know and love will ultimately be a thing of the past.

As you've read elsewhere in this issue of The Conservancy's Executive met with the City's senior planning staff, the Mayor and the new owner of the project. We are told "Mr. [Derek] Martin is very familiar with the February 2009 OMB decision and intends to build the project with the theatre, hotel and other components exactly as they were approved by the OMB." Glimpses of the model of the development included in an online article about a recent CKTB interview with the "Port Place team" [September 6th 2011) portray an ambitious effort.

It would be unfair to attempt to analyze or predict the manifestation of the current proposal at this time. We will be watching with great interest coupled with an occasional suspension of disbelief. To be continued....



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
